Attendance

It is really important that your child attends school 5 days a week. The week before half term the overall school attendance was only 90.3%. The chart to the left provides a break down when school days are missed during a school year.

We monitor each child's attendance regularly. Where a child's absence is 90% or below the child is classed as a persistent absentee. If you take your child on a holiday in term time it is likely that your child will be categorised as a persistent absentee.

As part of the absence monitoring process you may receive a letter inviting you to an attendance meeting. We want to support you in improving your child's attendance.

However, if attendance does not improve you may receive an Education Penalty Notice (EPN).
